Certification Agency?	Federal Aviation Administration (FAA)
Program Approval Required?	No, however, graduation from an FAA Part 141 (Code of Federal Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 1, Subchapter H, Part 141) approved program reduces the flight hours required for the test taker.
Program Approval Active?	Yes. Air Agency Certificate Number: DF2S766K. This certification is renewed every other year and is due for renewal August 2021.
Federal/National or By State?	Federal
Benefits of Certification	ATP Certification is required in order to act as pilot in command in operations conducted under FAA Part 121, 91.1053(a)(2)(i), 135.243(a)(1) or serve as second in command in flag or supplemental operations in part 121 in operations requiring three or more pilots.
Criminal and Misdemeanor Offenses	It is imperative to understand that employers across industries, the Federal Aviation Administration, and other agencies could deny employment, certification, licensure, or related benefits should you have a record of misdemeanor or felony activity. It is the student’s responsibility to research whether any past offenses may prevent or could limit opportunities in the future. Students must keep his/her record clear of any issues. The College has no control over how past or future offenses impact employability or the student’s ability to become certified or licensed.

Requirement to sit for exam(s)?	<p>The Restricted Airline Transport Pilot (ATP or rATP) certificate is not offered as part of the College’s program; however, graduates of the College’s associate degree program have the benefit of a reduced flight hour requirement should they decide to take the exam through the FAA.</p> <p>A person who trains in a program that is not approved under FAA Part 141 is required to complete 1,500 flight hours and meet the requirements of FAA Part 61.153 to qualify to take the FAA exam.</p> <p>Spartan College of Aeronautics and Technology’s associate program is approved under FAA Part 141; therefore, a graduate of the program will need to complete 1,250 flight hours and meet the requirements of FAA Part 61.153 and 61.160 in order to take the exam with the FAA to earn an ATP certificate.</p>
